Citizens are encouraged to check the site www.lwvno.org/s2010-orleans.html to find current information on all of the candidates running for office in Orleans Parish for the February 6 primary election. The League posed questions to all of the candidates and has published their unedited responses along with pertinent biographical information. All candidates were contacted and 78% of them responded. The site also provides links to government offices such as the LA Secretary of State and the Legislature. Other links include polling locations, sample ballots and upcoming election dates. During the 2009 elections, the League site experienced 81,000 hits, making it the most visited site for voter information in the Parish. MANY THANKS for the GENEROUS DONATION

Thank you to our dear friend and former LEAGUE president,
Betty Wisdom, who remembered us in her will
to carry on her lifetime mission of equity for all.

Betty Wisdom (1930-2007) was a civic activist, philanthropist and bibliophile who worked diligently toward the improvement of her beloved New Orleans. Of her numerous achievements, she considered her leadership as Chair of the Audubon Park Commission during the redevelopment of Audubon Zoo as her favorite. She helped turn it into its current nationally spotlighted standing and as a draw for families, the first real such venue New Orleans produced. As well as an animal lover, Betty was an ardent civil rights activist. In 1960, as a board member of Save Our Schools (essentially formed out of members of the LWVNO), she and 24 other women personally helped escort to and from school, the white children from the 12 families who were willing to keep their children in Franze School as little Ruby Bridges integrated it. As a result of this one successfully integrated public school, New Orleans was forced to integrate all of the schools. In 1994, Oprah Winfrey recognized the "S.O.S." for their work, along with the Little Rock 7 and Ruby Bridges. Betty was very honored to have been included with those whom she considered "the really brave".

Betty was President of the League twice and showed her love of the League by serving as chair of every committee the LWV offered and many of the study committees that resulted in our local 'program'. She was a founder of the Alliance for Affordable Energy in 1985 as it fought for fair and affordable energy policy for the city, serving on their Board for 22 years. Betty also served on the Board of ACLU, Agenda for Children, and other civic-minded organizations. However, building dollhouses that she donated for auctioning and donating children's books to local public schools were her two most joyful experiences. Of course, she also supported numerous cultural organizations, even sponsoring the training of several opera singers! In 1994, Betty received the Times Picayune Loving Cup for her lifetime of unpretentious volunteer work on behalf of her fellow New Orleanians. Betty was and always will be an inspiration.

Louisiana and New Orleans Join the Race to the Top

The Louisiana Board of Elementary and Secondary Education (BESE) voted on Tuesday, January 13, 2010, to approve Louisiana's application for \$300 million. The vote was the final approval step necessary to officially apply for the funds, which are targeted for struggling schools. The New Orleans Public Schools were one of only 28 districts to apply out of Louisiana's 70 districts - winners will be announced in April. Participating districts have agreed to a number of reforms designed to increase academic performance:

- To develop a "value added" measurement in which teachers, principals and other school leaders are evaluated. Student performances on standardized tests, attendance and drop out rates are three of the components of this measurement.
- This "value added measurement" will determine pay based on how well their students improve academically over the course of the school year.

Louisiana Governor, Bobby Jindal, has announced that he would pursue legislation to include value added student performance measurements in teacher evaluations. He proposes to enact this system even if Louisiana is not selected for the Race to the Top program. Declining state revenue is forcing statewide cuts in education and health services. This, of course, concerns classroom teachers who are facing larger class sizes, which often cause a decrease in academic performance for students needing more one on one instruction. The value added student performance measurements would thus be affected. These declines appear to also inhibit state and even national funding for facility repair and construction.

The concern locally about the status of public education in New Orleans focuses currently on the academic rating on the state LEAP test and the state graduation examination. An ever-growing number of charter schools are showing marked academic progress. The concern centers on those schools, which are still performing poorly. This issue has become entwined with the governance system of the three existing school governing bodies – the 33 Recovery School District (RSD) schools under Superintendent Paul Vallas and the 37 charter schools under the RSD umbrella; the 4 Orleans Parish School Board (OPSB) schools under Superintendent Darryl Kilbert and the 12 charters under the OPSB umbrella; and 2 charter schools under the direct partnership with BESE.

What is the next step in governance for the public school systems of New Orleans? In the current mayoral race, the candidates voice support of the movement to meet standards, prevent dropouts and increase principal and teacher performance. Dr. Andre Perry, CEO of the University of New Orleans charter-school network, recently stated, "In New Orleans schools, we now have multiple superintendents; we have multiple decision makers; we have a highly decentralized landscape. Who is going to be the arbitrator? Who is going to be the convener? The mayor is a proxy for who the people trust. And in education we need a person we trust to make hard decisions right now." The Cowen Institute of Tulane University recently listed three things the Mayor of New Orleans can do:

- Coordinate the New Orleans Master Plan with the School Facilities Master Plan
- Enforce truancy laws to get school-aged children off the streets and back in schools
- Support the recommendation made by the After-school Partnership to support youth.
